








FAIR

Origins

The fair was approved by the council on the 18th of September 1846 and inaugurated on the 18th of April 1847 in the Prado de San Sebastian. It began as a livestock and agriculture fair. Currently, it is the third week after Easter when the fair begins, it is considered as one of the most singular expressions of colour and joy where the Sevillians and those who visit us enjoy the party during six days every year. Since its beginning the fair had bullfighting events. The first fair was a success; there were about 25000 foreign visitors.





Location

The fair is located in the neighbourhood of los Remedios. It is divided into three sectors: "Real de la Feria", "Calle del Infierno", and the car park. It is distributed as follows; 25 blocks, 1048 casetas, 15 streets with names of some bullfighters from Seville and its province.



FAIR

The opening "El alumbrado"

It marks the beginning of the April Fair and takes place on Monday at midnight. The grand opening of "La Feria de Abril" is "El Alumbrado" (the lighting), which begins every year with the official lighting of the lanterns where half a million little lights are turned on at once, especially at the main gate. The April Fair ends with a firework display the following Sunday, again, at midnight.

Outside the tent you will find banisters and little triangle-shaped flags. Its sidewalks are covered with special yellow soil called: Albero. It is the same as the typical sand in bullrings, formerly and currently you are known to have gone to the fair because your shoes are yellowish.

It is advisable to come to the Fair with Sevillian people, who will accompany us on their usual route to tents of acquaintances and friends, because most of the tents are private; you can only enter there if you have an invitation. But this is not a problem because there are many others tents with open access for anyone prepared to visit them.

Family members and friends get together in the tents and enjoy dancing and singing the typical Sevillian dance. The origin of Sevillian dance would be in the years before the time of the Catholic Kings, in compositions that were known as "Seguidillas Castellanas", eventually evolved and were aflamencado, adding dance in the eighteenth century.





FAIR

Gatronomy

The night of "pescaito" is the starting point of the fair. It is the dinner previous to the lighting. The principal dish is fried fish: squid, cuttlefish, pijota fish, anchovies, plaices...

As a general must in the fair, you can't forget the plate of ham, dried meat, prows, salmorejo, montaditos, Spanish omelette...

As a tradition, for lunch each tent prepares "the stew" every day. Within these stews you can find lots of variety; potatoes with cuttlefish, chickpeas with cod...

Other tradition of the fair is sweet fritters or churros with chocolate.







La guita on the wrist is very easy, there is a brand of manzanilla wine whose name is "La guita", in the bottle there are a little cord (between 10-15 cm), and the people used to put on the wrist to know how many bottles had been consumed during the fair. Manzanilla and fine wine are drinks that have accompanied the fair since the beginning. In the recent years "Rebujito" has become very famous. It is a drink made of the combination of Manzanilla and soft-drink with a hint of lemon or lime and with a lot of ice.

Clothes

The style of dress for women in the fair is the "Flamenco dress". It is the only regional costume that changes depending on the fashion. The dress of the girls can be short or long, tapered, with lively colour, with different patterns or polka dots, with many flounces... The accessories are essential: flowers in the hair, necklaces, earrings...

The style of dress for the men in the fair is the "short suit". You can only use it during the day. It is made as follows: hat, waistcoat, handkerchief in his waist, ankle boots...

Horse and carts parade

At noon the traditional horse ride starts. The official timetable is from 12 P.M to 8 P.M. The horse ride is around all streets of the fair. People who ride a horse dress with the typical clothes: men with short suit and women with flamenco dress. The price for 45 minutes is about 50€.






The most important reason for going to the fair is just to have a good time with friends, enjoying it in a festive surrounding.



JURASSIC PARK

Coming up in movie theatres a new generation will have the opportunity to enjoy an adventure that started 65 million years ago. The question is f they will appreciate it the way we did 20 years ago. In 1990 the imagination of Michael Crichton brought us a story that three years later, the brilliant film-maker, Steven Spielberg would adapt to the big screen. Jurassic Park, which had a budget of \$63 million, was released in 1993 getting \$900 million worldwide. The film premiered at the National Building Museum, In Washington D.C., in support of two children's charities. Due to this success, Universal decided to make to sequels, The Lost World, in 1997, also directed by Spielberg, and 4 years later, Jurassic Park III, directed by Joe Johnston. As 2013 is the 20th anniversary of the movie, Jurassic Park 3D is coming to the cinemas, what's more, Jurassic Park 4 is supposed to be released on June 13, 2014, in 3D too.

There were different versions of the script and Spielberg was not particularly happy with any of them. Crichton was hired to adapt the novel for the screen although the version that was finally film was David Koepp. Crichton is credited as co-writer of the screenplay although Koepp insists he wrote his screenplay on his own, without having read Crichton's or any other's versions.










JURASSIC PARK

There were different versions of the script and Spielberg was not particularly happy with any of them. Crichton was hired to adapt the novel for the screen although the version that was finally film was David Koepp. Crichton is credited as co-writer of the screenplay although Koepp insists he wrote his screenplay on his own, without having read Crichton's or any other's versions..

Steven Spielberg was actually heavily into production of Schlinder's List when Jurassic Park was in post-production. To be able to oversee Jurassic Park's completion properly, he asked Richard Attenborough, who plays the part of John Hammond, to take over shooting of Schlinder's List for two weeks while he finished editing Jurassic Park. When Attenborough was not available, George Lucas handled day-to-day supervision of Jurassic Park, for which he got a special credit at the end of the film.








The movie was filmed in South California and Hawaii, where Hurricane Iniki caused the crew to lose one day of shooting, however, several storm scenes are actual footage shot during the hurricane.





JURASSIC PARK

Spielberg had advisors to learn about dinosaurs, Jack Horner, palaeontologist, supervised most of the designs to help the director portray the dinosaurs as animals and not monsters. Nevertheless, Spielberg did not always listen to him and some depictions of dinosaurs and inaccurate. For example, velociraptors were only the size of turkeys, although while filming, palaeontologists dug up a type of raptor as tall as 10 meters. In the film, the T-Rex's vision is quite important, apparently it was based on movement, since some reptiles exhibit this trait, Horner did not object to having Spielberg include it in the film, but more recent research suggests, however, that T-Rex probably had an excellent vision. That fearful roar of the T-Rex was actually a combination of animal sounds, including elephant trumpeting and, bizarrely, penguin mating sounds. The velociraptor squeal is a combo of walrus grunts and dolphin squeaks. And the deadly Dilophosaurus roar was created by combining howler monkeys, hawk screeches, rattlesnake hisses, and swan calls. Sound turned out to be a big deal in the production and post-production of the film.








JURASSIC PARK

One of the most iconic moments comes when the T-Rex escapes and try to hunting down the kids and the rest of the visitors and the glass of waters starts vibrating: On set, special effects supervisor Michael Lantieri plucked a guitar string underneath the cups to create the ripples, who would have guessed!



Apart from being a box office hit, Jurassic Park won the Academy Award for Best Sound Mixing, Best Sound Editing and Best Visual Effects, although I do not understand why it was not even nominated in any music category, the soundtrack by one of the geniuses when referring to soundtracks, John Williams, is breathtaking.

If you haven't seen the movie, I strongly recommend you to go and see it, and if you have, why not repeating the experience?







Anzac Day



In 1915, during World War I, Australian and New Zealand soldiers formed part of an expedition to capture the Gallipoli Peninsula along with Turkish and French soldiers among others. This was an Allied plan by Winston Churchill to open the way to the Black Sea for the Allied navies. The landing took place on the 25th April at dawn. There were a lot of casualties but the mission was a big success for the Allied forces. The following year, 1916, a commemorative march happened in London, involving around 2000 Australian and New Zealand troops who marched the streets of the city. A London newspaper called them "The Knights of Gallipoli".



Today, both countries remember these events on Anzac Day, honouring the members of the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps (ANZAC). With the coming of World War II, this day became one to commemorate all those who served and died in military operations for their countries.

In general, the traditions of this day are related to solemn ceremonies followed by social gatherings. Since the most important ceremony is at dawn, one of the traditions is the "gunfire breakfast" after dawn, consisting in coffee with rum, which is what many soldiers used to have for breakfast before facing battle.

In the social gatherings after the ceremony, Australians usually gamble in a game called two-up, which was extremely popular with the ANZAC soldiers. Also, the country has issued several stamps over the years to commemorate this holiday.



As for sports, there are three important events: the Anzac Day clash, which is an Australian football match between Collingwood and Essendon at the Melbourne Cricket Ground, the Club ANZAC Game, which consists of two rugby games, and the ANZAC Test, which is an annual rugby game between Australia and New Zealand fighting for the Bill Kelly Memorial Trophy.

As in its neighbouring country, there are a number of ceremonies; however, the most important one is The Dawn Service, which follows a prayer, hymns and a dedication that concludes with the fourth verse of Laurence Binyon's *For the Fallen*:

They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them.

Also, New Zealanders celebrate Poppy Day, which is marked on the Friday before Anzac Day. Poppies, particularly red poppies symbolise remembrance. This tradition is also followed in other Commonwealth countries.

Now, people remark on the number of young New Zealanders in the crowds. Some wear the medals their grandparents and great-grandparents won during war. There are now no veterans left from Gallipoli or the First World War.

H little country in the middle of Europe

Cheese, watches, chocolate, banks, different languages. Heidi, Red Cross, Jean-Jaques Rousseau, Wladimir Lenin. Geneva, Bern, Zurich. Peace and neutrality, peace and neutrality. High Gross Domestic Product. What else can we say about Switzerland, a little country in the middle of Europe?

COOKING CORNER

Traditional Anzac Biscuits

Ingredients

1 cup rolled oats
1 cup plain flour
3/4 cup white sugar
3/4 cup dessicated coconut
125 g butter
1 tablespoon golden syrup
1 teaspoon baking soda
2 tablespoons boiling water



- 1. Preheat oven to 180 degrees C.
- 2. Grease a biscuit tray.
- 3. Mix oats, flour, sugar and coconut together.
- 4. In a small saucepan over low heat, melt the syrup and butter together. Mix the soda and the boiling water and add to the melted butter and syrup.
- 5. Add butter mixture to the dry ingredients. Drop the mixture by teaspoons on greased biscuit tray.
- 6. Bake for 12-15 minutes.
